Enrollment Update

Currently, 228 owners from 28 states and 2 countries are enrolled with 591 pets. The 590 pets are comprised of 22 birds, 6 donkeys, 21 horses, 268 cats, 268 dogs, 2 rabbits, and 3 pocket pets. At this time, there are 19 dogs and 17 cats residing at the center.







Resident Pets' Medical Care

Our resident pets receive their medical care at the Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital, where we have access to experts in all fields of veterinary medicine. We have the ability to provide cutting-edge treatments to our resident pets when the need arises. All of the resident pets have, at the very least, annual exams and vaccinations. Geriatric residents have exams at least twice annually depending on their individual needs. Occasionally, a student resident will be on the case of one of our resident pets. This is always special for both the residents and the pets. We feel very fortunate to have the best of care available, just next door, any time day or night.
