

Pet Losses This Year

Since our last newsletter, we have lost 10 of our beloved resident pets. Nicky was a 15- year old cat who left us in 2017. Spider, a 17-year-old cat, left us in 2017 after nine years of residence with us. Happy, an 18-year-old Chihuahua, passed away in early 2018 after spending 12 years as the center's greeter dog. Chance, an 18-year-old cat, lived here for 8 years and passed on in 2018. Sweet Pea, a 16-year-old cat, passed away in 2018 after 6 years as a center resident pet. Ethel Mae, a 13-year-old English Setter, had lived here for 6 years until her death in 2018. Puppy, a 17-year-old cat, who had lived here for nearly 10 years passed away in 2018. Reveille VIII, a 12-year-old Collie and the retired mascot for Texas A&M University, left us in June of 2018 after 3 years in residence at the center. Arjun, a 17-year-old cat, had been with us for 3 years and left us in 2018. Marcie, a 12-year-old Collie, passed away in 2018 after a year and a half with us. This has been a very sad period for us with all of these losses. Every one of these pets was special and we truly feel their absence every day. They brought their owners and all of us such great joy. We are very appreciative of the opportunity to love and care for each of them.



New Pet Residents

Since our last newsletter there have been some additions to our center family. Mr. Tabby is a beautiful grey tabby cat who came to the center in April of 2017 from Las Vegas. He is a bundle of joy and acclimated right away to his new home. Then in September of 2017 two cats, Annie and Nicky, from Garden Ridge, Texas came to live at the center. Enrollment Update

There are currently 256 owners enrolled from 31 states and 2 countries with 647 pets. These pets are comprised of 24 birds, 2 donkeys, 14 horses, 300 cats, 298 dogs, 5 rabbits, and 4 pocket pets. At this time, there are 12 dogs and 14 cats residing at the center.

We currently have a moratorium on large animal enrollment as we work toward securing new facilities for large animals. This is a temporary situation.



Resident Pets' Medical Care

Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital provides all health care for our resident pets. We have access to experts in all fields of veterinary medicine right next door and they are able to care for any needs that may arise for our resident pets. The VMTH is a state of the art facility and is capable of handling all aspects of medical care, from routine preventive health care to after-hours emergencies. Our resident pets have medical exams annually along with their vaccinations. The geriatric resident pets go in for medical exams at least twice yearly depending on their individual needs. We are fortunate to have the teaching hospital right next door for our visits, day or night.







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Stevenson Center Advisory Board

The center is very fortunate to have 9 dedicated individuals that serve on the Stevenson Center Advisory Board. These dedicated individuals serve as a sounding board to the Director and Associate Director to render their advice on major decisions for the center. The board meets at the center three times annually. They are briefed at each meeting on all the activity of the center. Additionally, they are given a very detailed financial report. Their input has been invaluable to the staff over the past 20 years since the Dean first appointed it. The Dean upon the recommendation of the Director appoints six members to three-year terms. The remaining three are permanent members by virtue of their position with the college.


