





# **Enrollment Update**

Currently, there are 289 owners enrolled in the program from 35 states and 2 countries with 721 pets. The 710 enrolled pets are comprised of 349 cats, 326 dogs, 22 birds, 16 horses, 2 donkeys, 3 rabbits and 3 pocket pets. There are 9 dogs, 15 cats, and 4 rabbits residing at the center at this time.

There is currently a moratorium on the enrollment of large animals at the center. This should be a temporary situation as we pursue efforts to secure new large animal facilities.




# Resident Pets' Medical Care

Our resident pets receive their health care from the Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital. The VMTH is a state-of-the-art facility with specialists in many fields who can diagnose and provide treatment for the resident pets. The pets have annual exams and vaccinations. Some of our geriatric residents also have semi-annual exams. All of our pets' medical needs are met by the VMTH including emergency care. We are fortunate to be next door to the hospital for all of our needs, day or night.









# Stevenson Center Advisory Board

These dedicated individuals serve as a sounding board to the Director and Associate Director to render their advice on major decisions for the center. 
